

THE PROBLEM



~50% of trash could be recycled/composted

~60,000 tons/yr food disposed

Universal Recycling Law (Act 148)

- GOAL: To decrease the amount of waste disposed
- STRATEGY: To provide more consistent services statewide by increasing convenience, choices, and incentives for alternative disposal options

Highlights:

- ✓ Focuses on <u>recyclables</u> and <u>organics</u>
- ✓ Phased-in approach to allow development of infrastructure
- ✓ Organics Hierarchy

VT Universal Recycling Law Passed 2012

Comprehensive Solid Waste Policy

- Required Diversion (bans) = Motivation
 - recyclables
 - leaf, yard, and clean wood
 - food scraps
- □ Parallel Collection = Convenience
- □ Pay As You Throw = Incentive
- □ Recycling in Public Spaces = Lead by Example

Food Scraps: Phased Approach

Phases for larger food scrap generators, <u>if there is a</u>
 <u>facility within 20 miles</u>

- 2014 > 104 tons/year 2 tons/wk
- 2015 > 52 tons/year 1 ton/wk
- 2016 > 26 tons/year 1/2 ton/wk
- 2017 > 18 tons/year 1/3 ton/wk
- 2020 all food scraps banned regardless of distance



ReFED recommendations:

Standardize date labeling, consumer education, packaging adjustments



Bill Emerson Good Samaritan Food Donation Act (1996) – helps protect food donors from liability associated with donated food.

Food Rescue in Vermont

Policy/ Lawdriver of change and incentives

- Partnerships / Synergy
 - ■VT FoodBank
 - Gleaning
 - ■Farm to Plate
 - Schools




Food Bank & Food Rescue & UR

- FoodBank worked with supermarkets
 - Matched stores with nearby food shelves or others food recipients
 - Promoted direct delivery of fresh produce/perishable foods to local food shelves and others

Used UR law as an incentive

Increases in Food Rescue:
30% increase first year,
Additional 40% second year.
















Anaerobic Digesters

- □ 17 on-farm, manure and food processing waste
- 2 Pilot Projects for post-consumer food scraps






10 CertifiedOrganics Mgmt.Facilities

(8 compost, 2 AD)

 \sim 82% of towns are w/in 20 miles of a facility

Food Scrap Haulers





13 CommercialOrganics Haulers

~62% of VT has commercial organics hauling service or planned service

Universal Recycling is Working!

- All VT municipalities adopted Pay-as-You-Throw
- □ 5% decrease in MSW disposal (2014 vs. 2015)
- \square Diversion up 2%, from 33% to 35%
- Organics:
 - □ Food Rescue: increased 30%, then another 40%
 - □ Food scraps to Certified facilities up 14.7% (2015)
