With a forthcoming U.S. rule requiring water utilities to consider regionalization, this roundtable will address how states can facilitate local decisions to consolidate the nearly 50,000 water systems nationally in ways that improve compliance with the Clean Water Act and Safe Drinking Water Act and support economic development and environmental justice.
